John James Audubon

Growing up in Santo Domingo, now Haiti, Jean Jacques Audubon developed a love of the colourful birds he saw everywhere. When he was nine years old, his father, a lieutenant in the Royal French Navy, took him to France to live.

Jean Jacques's one passion in life was drawing birds. As a teenager he studied painting for a short time in Paris. However, in 1803, when he was eighteen, his father decided to send him to America to manage some mines in Pennsylvania. This was a fortunate move for the future of the young artist. The woods of Pennsylvania were humming with the activities of many magnificent wild birds.

Not long after arriving in America, Jean Jacques, now John James, married a neighbour's daughter and began raising a family. Audubon moved his family to Louisville and with a partner set up a general store. But Audubon spent little time tending to his work. His passionate search for new methods of painting and suitable examples of wildlife to draw left him little time for business. In 1819, he was thrown in debtors' prison. The sheriff took everything he could sell except Audubon's bird drawings. He thought they were worthless.

After getting out of jail, Audubon devoted his full time to painting. He worked hard at improving his style and spent many days travelling and setting down on paper beautiful examples of all the birds of America. These were hard years for Audubon and his family. But he knew now that he had something of value to give to the world.

On the advice of friends, Audubon went to Europe to seek a publisher for his work. In 1827 the first book of "Birds of America" was published. After his return to America he was recognised as a genius and a devoted explorer of nature's beauties. His lifelike paintings are still known and loved today.

The warm, clear waters of the Bahamas are full of life. Flashy fish rush in and out of colourful corals. Now, a newcomer threatens to ruin the delicate ecosystem of one of the world’s largest reef systems. (0)...B...

The red lionfish usually lives in coral reefs in the Indian and Pacific oceans. (26)..... Scientists are worried because a new species can do damage in places where it does not belong.

How did these lionfish end up so far from home? As disobedient pets. (27)..... In one case, six lionfish spilled into a Florida bay in 1992 when Hurricane Andrew broke their aquarium.
